

OBITUARY

George Howe

The many friends of George Howe, late of Fort William, where he was employed as shed foreman by the C. P. R., will be shocked to hear of his untimely end which was the result of his being run down by a street car in Quebec.

Mr. Howe joined the Fort William contingent of the Canadian expeditionary force but transferred to B battery of the Canadian royal horse artillery.

His battery marched out of Val Cartier camp Saturday, Sept. 25, to unable to do so that day, and the owing to some circumstances were unable to do so toot day, and the battery bivouacked on the agricultural grounds in Quebec for the night. Shortly after six o'clock, the same day, Mr. Howe was, knocked down and instantaneously killed by a street car going into the city.

His death, which is regretted by officers and men alike, caused great gloom all over the battery. To his intimate friends deceased was regarded as a man of most estimable character and his geniality endeared him to all.

His loss to the battery is considerable, where he pursued his new calling with keenness and avidity. It is understood that his remains will be shipped to his home in Toronto for burial.
