Private Roy Reported Safe—Private Jarvis Killed—McLeod in Hospital

The following message was received this morning by Louis Jarvis, south Harold street "Deeply regret inform you 1222 Private Jarvis (J. E. Jarvis) Princess Pats officially reported killed in action."

Private Jarvis was the 23 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Jarvis and was well known here having been employed by James O'Hagan in the grain trade. In his last letter Private Jarvis wished all his friends good-bye indicating that he had no hope of surviving the awful struggle that was to come.

John McLeod.

One of the regulation postcards, issued by the war office for sending brief communications to relatives, been received from John McLeod, by father, who resides at 530 Wiley street. All the stock messages are crossed out with the exception of the one which reads, "I am in hospital." No other particulars have been received.

Has Roy Returned?

In today's list of casualties the name of Francis A. Roy appears as having rejoined his unit. This information does not coincide with the word received by his father, George Roy, of Murillo, who has had word from his son that he is a prisoner in Germany. It is regarded as most probable that the information received by Private Roy's father will prove to be the correct version.

Walter Vennear.

In yesterday's casualty list of the eighth battalion the name of Walter Vennear is misspelt, as Walter Vennear, of Forest, Ont. Private Vennear was a member of Golden Gateway lodge of the A.O.U.W., and was employed here as clerk at the West hotel, enlisting with the first contingent when the call came for men. He is a widower and his daughter resides at Forest, which accounts for that place being given as his place of residence.

Sergeant Arthur Pearson, in yesterday's list, previously reported now reported wounded and missing, was and of members of 96th having served in Captain Swinburne's company, and spent two seasons at Sewell camp. He came from the old country with the Parkinson brothers who are all at the front, and was with them a soldier in the territorials before leaving England.
