

TWENTY TWO PORT ARTHUR MEN PRISONERS AT MUNSTER

Canadian Red Cross in London Receives a List
from the Camp—Several Others of Eighth
are There.

According to a list given out in London as having been received by the Canadian Red Cross, twenty-two men who enlisted for the first Canadian contingent at Port Arthur are prisoners of war at Munster, Germany. They are as follows:

Port Arthur Boys Write They are Prisoners in Germany

Uncertainty loomed after the Battle of Langhemarcq (Second Battle of Ypres) when many local soldiers attached to the 8th Battalion, 1st Division, 2nd Infantry Brigade were officially listed as missing. It wasn't until mid May when Port Arthur and Fort William residents learned that many of the soldiers listed as missing were taken away as prisoners of war to German POW Camps.
