THE SEVEN MACS JOIN THE R.N.C.V.R.

This morning Alexander McKay, David McCloud, and Malcolm McKay signed up for the Royal Navy Canadian Volunteer Reserve through the Citizens' Recruiting League office, at 23 North Cumberland street. These three men, as boys, all went to school together at Stornaway, Scotland. They met two years ago at the Head of the Lakes, and now all join the Navy together. They will go overseas Wednesday with Duncan McAskill, Andrew McKenzie, Thomas McCloud, and Duncan McDonald. Sgt. Major Manning, the recruiting officer, says these are not the Seven Musketeers of Dumas fame, but the Seven Macs from the Hebrides, and they are braw fine laddies, all near six foot.

While the 141st Bull Moose Battalion and 96th Lake Superior Regiment made much of the news in Twin Cities during the month of November 1916, there was a lot of activity with other military units as well:

- The Fort William Daily Times Journal speculated that the 212th Battalion, American Legion would be spending the winter in Fort William, with quarters at the steel plant in West Fort William
- A recruiting office for the Army Medical Corps was also opened in the Lakehead as Military District No.10 began seeking an unlimited number of enlistments for the corps
- Recruitment for the Royal Navy Canadian Volunteer Reserve which began the previous month also progressed positively in the Twin Cities in November
- The artillery squads stationed in Toronto would also see four local men leaving the Lakehead for training
- Recruitment in Fort William and Port Arthur also began for the 5th Pioneer Battalion, which was seeking 100 men who were skilled tradesmen or engineers
