CAPTAIN PEARSON GIVES GOOD TALK



In May 1917, a visitor to Thunder Bay provided citizens of Port Arthur and Fort William a firsthand account of the war and the courage displayed by the Canadian troops in battle. Captain H.A. Pearson, of the Toronto Y.M.C.A., enlisted in 1914 and left with the First Contingent overseas. The Fort William Daily Times Journal stated that Pearson was the first Y.M.C.A. man from any country to go to France. Over a two day period in the Lakehead, Captain Pearson was the guest speaker at three separate venues: the Avenue Hotel hosted by the Canadian Club, St. Andrew's Church and the Port Arthur Y.M.C.A.
