### Mr. George A. Eoll (1874 – 23 Dec. 1968)

George Eoll was a long time community leader and pioneer in Fort William. Born at Bristol, England in 1874 he immigrated with his family to Canada in 1888 at the age of 14. In 1902 at the age of 28, George Eoll moved to Fort William to join his brothers where he worked in insurance and real estate. In 1912 he began his first term as city alderman. The Fort William *Daily Times* said that Eoll "was a strong organizer and administrator of many organizations, both for community service and political campaigns." Over and above sitting on city council, he was also campaign secretary of the Red Cross for 22 years, volunteered with the Salvation Army and Canadian Cancer Society, and served victory loan and community chest drives. During World War One, George Eoll was registrar for 'alien enemies' in Fort William. On 23 December, 1968 Fort William lost a prominent citizen when Mr. Eoll passed away two days before his 94<sup>th</sup> year.

ALL GERMANS, AUSTRIANS, HUN-GARIANS AND TURKS, NATUR-ALIZED OR NOT, ARE CALLED TO REGISTER

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Offices for the registration of alien chembes have been opened in Port Arthur and Fort William, under the supervision of Mr. J. M. McGovern.

All residents of the two cities born

in Germany, Austria, Hungary or Turkey, are required to register, whether naturalized or not.

Considerable latitude is allowed the registrar and his clerks in the matter of regulations to be imposed upon those who register. Persons who have been in the country long and have shown themselves peaceful and law-abiding, will not have to do more than register. Others may be called upon to report once each month or if they show an inclination to be trou-

Those in needy circumstances may be taken care of by the government.
