

FOUR MEN IN THIS PORT ARTHUR FAMILY; THREE WENT TO THE FRONT

FOURTH ALSO WAS ANXIOUS TO GO

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ONE HAD TO REMAIN WITH
MOTHER—FATHER BACK AF-
TER SEEING SON KILLED

Returning home on furlough, Regimental Sergt.-Major James Morrison, 365 Tupper street, arrived in Port Arthur this morning. Sergt.-Major Morrison had left here in 1915 and had obtained leave only recently. One son had been killed in action and another, Alex., has returned to his home from France. Twenty-nine years and ten months is the service Sergt.-Major Morrison has had in the British army. He had belonged to the Seventy-second Seaforths and on coming to Canada was attached to the staff of the Cameron Highlanders in Winnipeg. On August 4, 1914, the day Great Britain declared war on Germany, he enlisted with the Ninety-sixth regiment in Port Arthur. He had three sons; all wanted to go, but it was necessary that one remain at home with Mrs. Morrison. After much discussion it was decided that John, the second son, remain. Alex. and James went with their father; James was killed by his side and Alex. is now at home, having been invalided from France.
