 The cities of Fort William and Port Arthur were very active during the month of December 1917 in terms of local military action. Recruitment continued in the Lakehead for the Royal Flying Corps with Lieut. A. MacNamara, head of the flying division, recruiting out of the Fort William Mayor's office. Early in December, the military unit was seeking pilots. However, by mid December, men skilled in other professions such as sailmakers, shoemakers, coppersmiths, tinsmiths and cooks were sought out to join the corps.

The Fort William Daily Times published the names of men from the Thunder Bay District and surrounding area who had recently joined the Signalling Corps. These soldiers had recently left the Lakehead for Ottawa to train for service.

Major J.A. Hawker, Canadian Engineers, traveled to Port Arthur to inspect the upper section of the old Port Arthur News Chronicle building. Once inspected and satisfied, the section would be turned into a shooting gallery for training.

It was previously reported in local newspapers that the Port Arthur Armouries would be the quarters for 100 soldiers from the 1st Manitoba Depot Battalion. 50 soldiers were granted leave to return to Winnipeg for the Christmas holidays. Once these men returned, the remaining 50 men would be given leave for the New Year's holidays.
